

FOLLOW UP TO THE IGA RECOMMENDATIONS

International Grail Spirituality Forum

The Spirituality Forum will be held at CASA de ORAÇÃO SANTA RAFAELA MARIA (Prayer House Santa Rafaela Maria), Palmela, Portugal. Participants are to arrive on July 31, 2007. The Forum will be August 1 to August 7. Departures will be on August 8.

The Invitation Letter to the Spirituality Forum will be sent to the International Grail in January 2007 by Ticha Vasconcelos. The letter will contain: goals; pre-program; who is to come (criteria); what is to be paid by each one; financial solidarity; programs after the Forum.

All Grail members have had the opportunity to share their concerns about spirituality through the Spirituality Papers circulated by the Spirituality and Theology Network Coordinators in January 2006. Many Grail groups and some individuals sent responses that brought rich insights. IGA delegates received copies of the group responses and the Summation of Groups' Responses to the Questionnaire which was prepared by the Spirituality and Theology Network in July 2006. Any Grail member who would like to see the responses and the Summation can get them from her IGA delegate.





Solidarity through the International Assistance Fund (IAF)

The IAF gives support to those among us who have served the Grail and need subsidy in our "sunset" years. This subsidy could help in health care and related living expenses to enable a dignified life. The IAF also provides for emergency or contingency allowance in case a Grail team in a country suffers from drought, etc. The IAF Team (IAFT) is Josette Kersters, Frances Broekhoven (both of The Netherlands) and *Jeanette Loanzon* (The Philippines). They administer the IAF account, provide periodic reports to the ILT and examine the applications.

The IAFT gets information about the prevailing situation in a country and the needs of the Grail members from National IAF Teams or National Leadership Teams (NLTs). Through these teams, they are able to assess how the IAF can support members in their health care needs as they "grow older and wiser in the Grail". Likewise it is the National IAF Teams or NLTs who could best inform the IAFT if

times are so difficult that the nutrition and living standards of members/teams are impaired. They help all Grail members to be aware that there is possibility of assistance through the IAF. The IAFT tries to give assistance as promptly as possible. The IAFT also needs to know if needs have changed.

When the IAFT sends money to an NLT, the NLT should tell the IAFT as soon as the money arrives. The currency exchange rates and bank charges fluctuate in the financial markets in these times of global uncertainty. Therefore it is very important for the IAFT to know whether the money has been received.

IAF funds should be allocated effectively and efficiently. The IAFT would like the IAF to be an incentive for the NLTs to explore ways to move in the direction of greater self-reliance. They want to work on this goal with National IAF Teams and NLTs as an example of women who are transforming their societies through "help through self help." (See IGA 2006 Report, p.14-15.)

Grail Global Networks

Human Trafficking Network Ton Brouwer

Combating trafficking was named at IGA 2006 as one of the ways the Grail internationally intends to work for justice for women. Trafficking of women and girls is a worldwide problem due to poverty and globalization.

The Grail as a women's movement will concentrate on combating trafficking of women, girls and boys, and forced prostitution. Grail members in the 17 countries represented at the IGA were named to start this research on trafficking of women and girls in their countries. I am now contacting these women to encourage them to start the research and look for organizations or co-workers against trafficking of women. The 17 countries are: Australia, Brazil, Canada, Germany, Italy, Kenya, Mexico, Mozambique, The Netherlands, Papua New Guinea, The Philippines, Portugal, South Africa, Sweden, Tanzania, Uganda, and the USA.

Since the IGA, Rosaurora Espinosa sent me "A Study on Trafficked Women in Mexico City" by her colleague Dr Arun Kumar Acharya; Marian Schwab wrote a monthly column for the Catholic newspaper on "Trafficking on Mexican Border." In Australia, Mary Robinson is the Grail link with the Religious Working Group and with lawyer Jennifer Burn. This is just the beginning and I hope that we all will be alert to trafficking of women and forced prostitution and help to prevent it.

Grail/UFER Linkage Group to the United Nations Sharon Joslyn

We attend the monthly meetings of both the NGO working group with Commission on the Status of

Women (CSW) and the Working Group on Girls (WGG), a committee of UNICEF which is dedicated to advancing the rights and status of girls worldwide. Grail members with yearly UN passes also meet once a month to consider our involvement as NGOs and how we can make a contribution within this complex organism.

The IGA 2006 approved the creation of a part-time paid position for a Grail representative to the UN attached to the Grail/UFER Linkage Group to the UN. See page 12 of this *Crossroads* for this job posting.

The CSW-51 to be held at the UN Headquarters in New York City will focus on the theme: the elimination of all forms of discrimination and violence against the girl child. The meetings will be held 26 February to 9 March of 2007. Most of the Grail/UFER Linkage Group involvement this year will be in preparation for and participation in this event. The Grail expects to have 40 people including 13 teenage girls from Canada, Honduras, Mexico, Mozambique, Portugal, South Africa, and the USA. Some of the girls will be sponsored by the Grail, some received scholarships, and others are raising funds. The girls who are under 18 years of age will be accompanied by an adult in most instances. The girls will be housed at the Grail Center in the Bronx. In addition to Grail members from the USA, especially the New York area, others coming to the CSW are: Elly König (The Netherlands) who is coming with two young Dutch women—Elly represents the Grail on the UFER Board; Andjelka Rudic (Croatia) who is involved with the LIEN Network; and Marita Estor (Germany) who is coming as part of the German government delegation.

The Working Group on Girls will give a special orientation to be held for the girls on Saturday 24 February on three areas: UN Etiquette, Media Relations, and Advocacy skills.

Project 1. Our Footprint on the Earth.

Each IGA delegate received a copy of the Footprint tool created by *Ina Conradie* in South Africa for all of us to use and a list of website references where other material can be found.

An example of one of the ways to cut down on global warming: Sibongile Mtungwa and Marilyn Aitken have made a pact not to exceed 90 kms p.h./ 56 m.p.h. as far as possible, when they are driving on the open road because traveling at high speeds, even within the speed limit, uses a great deal of petrol/gasoline. Besides cutting down on the emissions from your car, there are other advantages: you save money; your car engine lasts longer; you arrive at your destination more relaxed; you are less likely to have an accident; and, if you do have one, the impact will be reduced.

Project 2. Education about Genetic Engineering

Thoko Makhanya participated in the Biopolitics Spring School sponsored by the Heinrich Boell Foundation. The objectives were to build capacity for Southern Africa in a cross-section of interest groups; to empower role players already involved with biopolitical issues in a number of ways; to build support and cooperative links between civil society, government departments and scientists; to bring together food and medical biotechnology (green and red) in a common learning process; and to provide specific training for participants. The modules provided were quite intensive. She is working on some possible applications on the local scene. She would like suggestions from those engaged or wanting to engage in biopolitical issues at the international Grail level.

Thoko recently held a day's seminar and workshop on food security, farmer's role, and genetic engineering (G.E.), jointly with GRAIN International. The focus was on the challenge faced by Bt cotton farmers and the farmers of food crops in adjoining areas. The clear message they articulated was, 'being in a trap,' they want to come out, but there are no options any longer. Bt is a bacterium modified by genetic engineering for use as a biopesticide against insects.

Project 3. Education about Environmental Issues

The resources of the Grail and other organizations need to be studied and adapted according to our own realities. Please let us know of good resources. Global Warming, Climate Change and Desertification — We developed a simplified questionnaire for young people relating to their everyday activities like modes of transport, sources of food and transportation, fuel sources, and waste to help them understand how they contribute to climate change.

Wangari Maathai has recently suggested that those who travel by air locally should plant a tree after every flight and that those who make transcontinental flights should increase the number of trees they plant.

Sibongile and Marilyn have developed a donga rehabilitation project that will encourage the planting of grass and trees and good farming practices in a highly eroded place near us. The process is going to create dialogue and develop knowledge within communities to deal with soil erosion.

Destruction of native species/ take over by exotics — We ask Grail members to promote biodiversity by eating unprocessed grain that grows in your area. Sorghum and maize has become breakfast for Sibongile, and millet and sorghum is used for dinner. After quite a search, Marilyn found sorghum seeds to plant in her garden for consumption, but also as a way of propagating sorghum seeds. You can do the same in your gardens. Plant drought resistant seeds and indigenous flowers and herbs.

Women of the Americas Network Samia Saad

The Women of the Americas Network seeks to empower women and communities through strengthening women's leadership and creative potential in areas of: spirituality, education, cultural diversity, the environment, health, gender, and economic literacy.

We work together with women from South, Central and North America to:

- Build a shared awareness of the social, political, environmental, and cultural forces, which shape the North/South reality.
- Examine and critically analyze the dynamics of globalization and how it currently impacts the lives of women and their families.
- Develop concrete strategies and actions of solidarity.

- Encourage partnerships with other organizations and movements that share a similar vision.
- Sponsor leadership training, workshops, and conferences to share concrete skills and strategies for work in the community.
- Outreach to young women and women engaged in grassroots community work.

We organize a variety of projects and activities in different countries (Mexico, Brazil, United States, Canada, and Honduras) that unite women and strengthen their skills. Right now we are working on a youth leadership program that focuses on enhancing and forming young women's leadership.

This project started two years ago and it is divided into three phases. The first one consisted of doing an assessment (diagnostic) of the needs of young women in each country (Mexico, Brazil, United States, Canada and Honduras). The second phase was national meetings and ongoing trainings where the outcomes of the assessment were discussed and where young women were given skills on peer leadership training.

We are now working on the third phase of this program. The women involved in this project will meet in Honduras from July 16 to 21, 2007 to discuss the outcomes of the assessments. We will use the methodology of popular education as a tool to build awareness of global problems, and to impart tools and strategies in order for women to be active participants for change in their own communities once they get back home.

LIEN Network Sara Jona Laisse

Two LIEN Network members, *Abida Jamal* from Mozambique and *Andjelka Rudic* from Croatia, will be present at CSW conference in New York in 2007. Abida will be participating and taking Denise, the 14 year old girl that Graal–Mozambique recommended. Andjelka will represent the LIEN network.

The LIEN Network is an open space for young women, a place for reflection on life, study, work and spirituality, a place to express and share personal experiences, questions, and fears. By doing so, they can develop their own leadership and spirituality.

Dear sisters around the world,

For the **Grail National Meeeting** in August 2006, Zodwa Mabaso and Samkele Mhlanga worked out ways to help the members experience some of the work of the IGA. Josephine Maluleke and Idah Khoma, both from Gauteng, made their Grail commitment at a special celebration.

Kwazulu Natal Region: Work on environmental issues and genetic engineering is going on in local, national and international areas, for example: Sibongile Mtungwa and Marilyn Aitken have facilitated a number of Environmental Training of Trainers' workshops. Siblongile is now working in her home area of Sibizane, Centocow, trying to understand why the area is so degraded and infertile. Jane Ngobese has been involved in the poverty alleviation programme in her parish and the community in KwaMashu. Thoko Makhanya, as part of the SA Freeze Alliance Genetic Engineering, has been involved in local awareness raising and developing resources in Zulu. In March 2006, Thoko travelled to New Zealand to take part in a campaign organised by Greenpeace to stop the NZ government from endorsing Terminator Seeds.

The Cape Region: The launch of new Village Centre will be on Saturday 4 March 2007, when the 100-voice multiracial "Libertas Choir" will be performing in the Amphitheatre. The Cape Town Grail recently spent 2 days on a retreat including 8 people from Kleinmond itself and 9 people from Cape Town. The retreat dealt with the difference between spirituality and religion, styles of leadership and primal religions. In July 2006, 14 people took part in a two-day life planning workshop led by Sally Timmel.

Gauteng Region: Members write of the University of the Third Age, a non-profit international organisation formed to provide intellectually stimulating programmes of learning and to provide social contacts for mature people in partial or complete retirement. From time to time Nokuthula Nzimande has been working with a team responsible for the HIV/AIDS prevention programme and care of orphans and vulnerable children in 20 projects in Witbank diocese.

From The Grail in Italy

The Grail in Italy meets on Saturday afternoons and all day Sunday once a month. In 2005-2006 they had formation meetings for new Grail participants, an open meeting on Feminist spirituality, participated in the European Feminist Theology meeting in Rome in March 2006, made contacts and participated in meetings organized by other groups and communities, led spirituality research meetings, and translated *The Grail in the* 21st *Century* into Italian.

The Grail in Italy wants to continue: to carry on the activities which they are already doing; to develop new relationships with young women and immigrant women; to organize public meetings on topics of feminist theology and spirituality; to promote meetings with other Grail groups in Europe; and to create an Italian Grail association, in order to be recognized as a public society.

World Social Forum

The World Social Forum (WSF) will take place in Nairobi, Kenya from January 20 to 25, 2007. The forum will address topics such as war and militarization, security and peace and globalization. Feminist dialogues will be held before the Forum begins.

Report on the UN Secretary General's Study on Violence against Women by Jenna Messier

On October 9, 2006 the *In-Depth Study on all Forms of Violence against Women* was released by the Office of the Secretary-General. This report can be accessed online at http://www.un.org/womenwatch/daw/vaw. The 140-page study asserts two strong conclusions: "the conditions which enable this violence against women are socially produced and therefore the processes by which they are produced can be altered" (372) and "violence against women is a violation of human rights." (364)

Three main ways in which Grail women as part of an international NGO can help by: pushing their governments to ratify human rights treaties such as the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women; "ensuring that women know their rights and are empowered to demand and exercise them" (378); contributing to the collection of data on promising practices; and evaluating policies which are effective in preventing and addressing such violence. The Grail/UFER Linkage Group to the UN urges Grail members everywhere to work against violence toward women.

From the "One World Discussion Group"

The "One World Discussion Group" of Grail members from Germany and the Netherlands shared their concerns as they prepared a weekend with German Grail members on the theme "Living in Solidarity with our world." They made a SWOT analysis of the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats as Grail. Carla van Thiel sent the analysis in a letter to the NLTs and local teams in Uganda and Kenya, to NLTS in Germany and the Netherlands and to the ILT. Carla asked for feedback for the next meeting of the discussion group on January 5-7, 2007.


